



NEW PRODUCTS OF INTEREST TO HAMS By Lyn, W3NSI

- 1. FM TRANSMITTER/RECEIVER: The New Midland 13-500, 15 watt FM unit has 12 channels and a choice of 1 or 15 watts of output. Three channels are supplied 146.16/76, 146.34/94, and 146.94 simplex. Each of the T/R xtals has a trimmer for frequency adjustment, unlike most 2M FM units which have trimmers only on the transmit channels. A connector is built in for use with a tone burst unit, where such would be needed to turn a repeater on. A meter reads FSM on transmit and is used as an S meter on receive, Price, \$250.00 P.O. - 2. TEMPO 6N2 AMPLIFIER: The 6N2 will run 2000 PEP or 1000 watts input on CW or FM on 6 and 2 meters. 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

CLEGG 22ER FM S METER ADD ON, BY Lyn, W3NSI

Many of the lads owning Clegg 22er FM units have expressed an interest in connecting an S meter on the receiver section to give relative readings while turning beam antenna, or monitoring changes being made in another station. Due to the characteristics of FM reception, once a signal reaches a given strength, it is difficult to notice any additional increase in signal strength by ear. Older tube type commercial gear users can of course read limiter current at that test point.

The circuit below is simple. It works and can be wired with the meter external to the receiver unit. A three terminal strip was mounted on the back of the 22er here to use for the three connections needed. The meter zero control is mounted on the front of the box in which the meter is mounted. It can then be adjusted at any time to get a usable reading for the purpose at hand.

Six meters showed a slight increase on activity during January, possibly due to the contests i.e. January SS and the Space net contest which seemed to be enjoyed by all who entered it. Two meters has continued as usual and the two meter net on Monday nite has attracted 28 stations for three weeks in a row.

It was noted in the January Contest that six meter activity (number of stations worked) had declined about 12% from the previous year. But the two meter activity picked up about the same amount. It was reported also that quite a few stations not heard in the January Contest were heard during the Space Net Contest. It would be interesting to delve into the reasons for this -- maybe shorter contest -- use of zip codes as multipliers -- bonus for low power, etc.

Haven't heard any new reports on moonbounce except that a group of Ohio stations are trying to work Australia and Hawaii via the moon - no report on results to date.

I have a letter from WB6NMT which requests schedules for 222.0 Mhz moonbounce contacts. Bruce, K2RTH is presently engaged in preparing antennas for such a contact. WB6MMT runs high power and a rhombic antenna aimed East - consequently, anyone who wants to try to contact him MUST have a tiltable, steerable array with 19-21 db gain.







SO YA WENT TO JAMAICA: By George, W3HK

Jamaica is an island paradise and it is a land of paradox too! It is warm during the day and cool during the night. Their suburbs that would vie with Hollywood, and their slums the likes of which you have never seen. There are the "haves", and the "havenots." There is no middle class. The road may be a beautiful highway and suddenly become nothing but coral and pot holes big enough to blow out the tire of a mac truck: Everything is done slowly but driving, everyone drives like there is no tomorrow. I wrote to our minister and told him that he should see how they drive in Jamaica, everyone believes in God and they are all anxious to meet him. You seldom see any police, but when you do be careful, they mean business and there are no committeemen to fix tickets. One thing that people hold closely is their drivers license. In order to get a drivers license, you must prove that you need one. Once you get it you can keep it. Just a desire to buy a car and drive won't get you a license, you must need it for work or there is no local transportation, etc. If you should lose your license and not have a need for it, that's it, you start walking. Walking in Jamaica isn't as bad it might seem, all you do is stand along side the road and hold out your arm, jiggle your hand a bit and any car with space in it will stop and give you a lift. Natives travel all over the island this way. it is so universal there is no real problem of who you pick up. The scenery varies from cattle grazing fields to sugar cane, cocoanut palms, royal palms banana trees, pines and others I can't name. There are mountains and bamboo and ferns that are fifty feet tall and arch over the road like a tunnel. There are rocky shores and sandy beaches. If you go away from the tourist traps there are beaches white and clean and you can look as far as you can in either direction and not a soul in sight. The water is around 75 degrees and there is no large surf close in. The surf is about 1000 feet off shore at the edge of the reef. The water goes from about a foot deep at the sandy edge to shoulder high at the reef, there it drops to 600 fathoms (3600 ft): Now there are some problems. First you cannot get a telephone unless you are a real VIP. The line voltage is 100 plus or minus a few volts. frequency of the line voltage is 50 cycles. (Clocks run slow!!) only one TV channel and that is like trying to listen to channel two in Philadelphia, snow, flip flop, etc. Mail comes but not regularly. water is good but the pressure varies from a trickle to slow! Native food is cheap, but if you want to eat as you do at home that is another thing. Most of the cars are the small compact types. Driving is on the left side and that can be a real thrill until you get adjusted. Most of the native drivers believe that blowing the horn makes everything safe. Roads are far from straight and trucks and busses with their horn blowing come around corners in the middle of the road and you have to jump sideways! If you are not going fast enough for the guy in the rear, he leans on the horn until you do or he can pass. Passing is when he gets along side, hit the brake for he will come right over with no warning at all. There are many accidents but there should be many more!! The nearest thing to the seashore as we know it is at Doctors Cave'. Here you pay to go on the beach, there is a place to get a bite to eat, bath houses, a walk and benches to sit and watch bathers. No ball playing or radios are allowed. As you travel around you can hear music. Every store or tap room has an excellent Hi-Fi and it is (CONTINUED)

going at full volume. Again the loudest guy attracts the most customers and the louder it is the better the bar is supposed to be. Young people are dancing in the street and everyone seems to be doing things to rythm. Marketing in Falmouth is two days a week. On market days, everyone that can walk, carry a large basket on their head, drive or use the bus does so. What a crowd and again music blasting all the time. The people are very friendly and believe it or not they are very clean. They wear bright colors and short dresses WOW. Most of the men wear long sleeve shirts even tho it is warm. The men and boys usually carry one tool with them, a Machette, They use it for grass cutting, cane cutting, cocoanut cutting and opening *= even cutting down trees. They also carry a file to keep the machette sharp at all times. Ham radio as we know it is not present in Jamaica. hams there are few and far between. As a result, you do not have any local interference. Almost all stations you hear are DX. The pile-ups that occur when you call CQ are at the other end and you just sit and wait for the smoke to clear. I could have worked WAS and WAC while visiting K3WEU but the net controls didn't want to start something they might not be able to stop so I gave up! K3WEU/6Y5 has antennas for all HF bands and you can work him any night after 7:00 P.M. on about 3.805 MHz. There is no VHF activity and may not be for a while. Repeaters are being used by the commercial radio for trucks and taxi service. There is no FM station as yet. The AM band is OK at times, other times the Cuban stations are on top of US stations or local stations. There is one newspaper and it covers the news both local and worldwide rather well. It is odd tho to see an ad from a Doctor saying he is still in business, the problem is his phone is out of order for weeks even months. On all requests for help (Plumber Electrician, etc.) the reply is #soon come' This can mean anything from an hour to months, what's your There are parts of Jamaica that are still plenty wild, the natives speak a language all their own and dislike visitors. We got into some of that country and on coming out people looked at us in total surprise when they found out we had no guide! The main buildings of the old plantage tions are referred to as Great Houses. Many have been restored for tourist sites. Rose Hall for example cost over a million and a half to restore, but it is beautifully done. Now, if you want to be a tourist there are lots of elegant hotels, motels and single homes that can be rented complete with staff. They even boast of one hotel The Frenchman Cove as being the most expensive in the world. 6 to 12 hundred dollars a week. Then there are the in-bond shops by the zillion. Real bargains too. This is where we got most of our Christmas presents and had fun doing it. If you like sea food, Jamaica is for you. Paul, K3WEU/6Y5 goes down to the water front every day or so and meets the fishermen as they come in from sea. He buys fresh live fish and lobsters, puts them in the ice box in the car and scoots home to have them cooked. Paul has a large house on the top of a hill about 200 feet that over-looks the sea only about a mile away, His antennas are strung between palm tress and he is doing real well on 100 volts and 50 cycles with 120 volt 60 cycle gear!! So that's Jamaica as I

saw it, a real tropical island, but the best part of it all was coming home!!

The Mt. Airy VHF Radio Club is pleased to again submit the logs of its membership activity in the January 1973 VHF Sweepstakes. Our total of 60 logs represents a combined club score of 564,784 points. Each log has been checked by the operator and at least one other member of our contest committee. We trust you will find them in good order.

We are again enclosing a computerized summary of our membership activity sorted alaphabetically by station call, in order of contest points, number of contacts, and number of sections.


Although our total score is close to that of last year, activity seems to have again declined this year over previous years. This year's effort to keep our score up has been obtained by increasing our average score up to 9,572 points per member which is very close to our all time high. This average has been brought up due to an increase in station capability not due to an increased number of contest stations. Activity to the northeast was low again as it was last year but Eskip into the southeast did bring out a few 4s and 5s as multipliers. Members equipped for ssb and cw scatter and extended ground wave on 6M and 2M added multipliers that were not available in any other mode of operation.


