VHF/UHF REPORT BY JO, W2EIF

The VHF/UHF bands have been performing normally for this time of year. Six meters has begun to exhibit openings. These started as usual in the first week of May. This morning (May 17th) I worked W4GDS, Bob in Florida. He reports that openings down Florida way have been very scarce this year with only a few short openings between December and the present.

The 2 meter band is functioning normally and the nitely contacts with WSDGF and KSIII at the low end on 144.105 continue as they have for the past 3 years. This is a 350 mile path across the mountains but good antennas and high power can do the job consistently. The spring folliage doesn't seem to attenuate signals even on wet rainy nites.

There has been a drop off in activity due to the various operators being engaged in pet projects such as Moonbounce, June QSO Party preparation, etc. Herb, WA3WOM worked W6PO in California on May 7th. He reports that he had no success until the moon was on the horizon. Herb uses an 8877 amplifier running 2 KW PEP and feeds this to 4 Swan 12 element beams mounted on about 13 foot The gain is better than 21 DB. There have been several short auroras lately and one of the better ones occurred on Sun. May 13th. Our new member, KlJDY/3 Bill was using CW and knocking off quite a few DX contacts including W8YIO in Michigan for a new state. 220 Mhz seems to have dropped off a bit in activity. The only really active station heard here consistently is Pets. KlPXE in Connecticut. 432 activity seems to be waiting for the Summer openings. Bert, K3IUV checked out his own and W2EIF's 1296 Mhz pre-amplifiers using the Japanese transister 25C 1336. Both worked extremely well on the lst try and performed similarly despite the different construction techniques used. Bert put his ahead of his 1296 converter and reports his reception on the band tremendously improved. He is now hearing stations in Virginia and Connecticut, The preamplifier is undoubtedly the simplest construction that I every undertook and it is almost impossible to produce a non-workable unit. 2300 Mhz is also exhibiting activity with one of the leaders in the activity being Doug, WA2LTM who has attended a few of our meetings. By the time you read this, Tony, KlSFF/3 will have completed his 1296 expedition to Delaware. It is scheduled to be operational on Sat. May 19th from a spot on the Northern Delawage border near the Brandywine racetrack. The station will be looking for contacts on 1296 Mhz from all corners and will use the call W3CCX/3. It is hoped that a report of the event will be found elsewhere in this issue.

1296 Mhz Delaware Expedition

A 1296 Mhz Pack-Rat station (W3CCX/3) under the control of Tony Sousa, K1SFF/3 was operated from the highest point in Delaware on Sat, eveing May 19, 1973. The location was on the 100 ft. Wilmington, Delaware repeater tower. The station was manned and operated by K1JDY/3, K1SFF/3, WA2LTM and WA3NGK. The 1296 expedition made available the State of Delaware for the 1296 Mhz crowd. Eleven (11) contacts were made in five (5) States as follows:

EDITORS NOTE: The following letter should clarify many misconceptions of ARRL policy especially as it applies to the Technician Licensees

Dear Joe:

Ellen White has asked me to provide you with some packground information on past and present ARRL policies with respect to the Technician License and incentive licensing. We understand that you want this information to page along to Techs who perhaps have been misinformed about League policies.

The League has consistently encouraged the growth and development of the Technician license; in fact, the concept was first proposed by ARRL in 1946 (but shortly withdrawn because of an imminent ITU allocations conference). When the license class was finally made available in 1951, only the frequencies above 220 MHz were authorized. With League backing, six meters was added in 1955 and two meters in 1959; the League supported full Tech privileges in the two-meter band at that time, but the FCC authorized only the middle half of the band.

Throughout the incentive licensing controversy, the League position was that the incentive system should be limited to the 80-15 meter phone bands and should be instituted gradually over a period of years, with plenty of opportunity for assessment of its effects. It is worth emphasizing that, under the ARRL incentive licensing proposal, no amateur would have been required to pass a higher-speed code test to retain his privileges. General licensess would have earned full privileges by passing the Advanced written exam with no code exam at all. The whf bands were not affected in any way by the League's proposal. The ARRL petition (RM-499) was filed in 1963, and was not the first filed with the Commission to advocate incentives dealing with this topic. Eventually, a total of seventeen petitions were filed by individuals and groups.

When the FCC released its Report and Order relating to incentive licensing in 1967, the lower 250 kHz of the six meter was listed as an eventual exclusive Advanced and Extra allocation. The League opposed this reduction of Technician (and General) privileges on this band in a petition for reconsideration; while the petition was denied by the FCC and the cw band became exclusive territory on schedule, the second phase involving the first 150 kHz of the phone band was never instituted, due at least in part to the protests of the League.

In 1969 the Board of Directors proposed: (1) full Technician privileges on two meters; (2) full Technician privileges between 29.5 and 29.7 MHz; and (3) dual holding of Novice and Technician licenses, to give Techs a better chance to increase their code speed by on-the-air practice. All of these proposals are on file with the Commission, (as RM-1535) and we hope for early favorable action on them.

For additional background, see the following issues of QST; September 1959, p. 79; October 1967, p. 78; November 1968, p. 65; December 1969, p. 9; January 1970, p. 72; and February 1970, p. 64.

In passing I might mention that RM-577, filed on March 3, 1964 by Wayne Green of Peterborough, N.H. proposed (among other things) an ssb allocation from 50.01 - 50.1 MHz available exclusively to holders of a new "Extra Phone" license. Of course, this particular proposal was not adopted by the Commission. Needless to say, such a proposal was (and is) contrary to the policy of the ARRL Board of Directors, which has called for full privileges for Technicians on all whf amateur frequencies for the past fourteen years.

To summarize, the League has been consistent in its support of increased privileges for Technicians. As are all League policies, this support has come from the Board of Directors -- a group of sixteen active and experienced hams which is elected by the membership of ARRL. Every League member has a change to influence League policy by expressing his opinion to his director; the non-member, of course, has no real voice in League affairs.



FROM THE RA RA RAG -- INSURED? ARE YOU? By Ash Palmer K2EAW, President, E.F. Ashley Insurance Co.

A fair number of Hams operating on 2 meter F.M. are aware of a recent experience I had with my Drake TR-22.

Since 1954 mobile gear of various types have cluttered the underdash of my vehicles. During this span of time no trouble was encountered with "other parties" removing the gear.

Having parked at the same "attended" parking lot for over 15 years the keys to the car were always left in the car as requested by the attendant so he could move the vehicle if he needed to. On October 30, my TR-22 was inadvertently left in the car instead of being taken to the office as usual. The inevitable happened - little TR-22 was missing when I picked the car up after work.

This leads to several points that all Hams with mobile or portable gear should follow:

- 1. Never leave your car unlocked even in an "attended" lot. Insist that the car be parked so it will not have to be moved and you take the keys. Most lots will co-operate.
 - 2. In case of loss, make sure you are able to supply the police with serial number as well as value and make a report as soon as possible after loss.
 - 3. Engrave your name and address on the gear using one of those little vibrator type engravers.

A couple of interesting insurance questions came up also. Is the gear covered? If so, under what policy? This equipment can be covered by insurance if certain criteria are met. You automobile policy covers only the car and its "related" equipment permanently attached thereto.

Permanently attached Ham equipment should be endorsed on to your auto policy if you wish your auto policy to cover these or similar two way radio items. This will eliminate any possible questions.

The other area of coverage is your Homeowners Policy. A good number of these policies contain an exclusion for theft from an "unattended" automobile unless there are "visible signs of forceful entry to the exterior of the car," Most people know that a good thief can enter your fully locked car and leave no sign of entry. You can take an oath on a stack of bibles that your car was locked, but unless there are "visible signs" there is no coverage. This little exclusion can be eliminated by having an "Extended Theft" endorsement attached to your policy.

Of course, any coverage would be subject to a deductible that might apply to your policy.

I hope my experience will help point up the need for more care of mobile equipment.

Certainly most Hams are aware of the consternation which has been cast in the ranks of amateur radio by the recent actions of the FCC and Mr. Walker, but hearing him tell it like it is (in his opinion) is very revealing.

Mr. Walker makes very skillful use of all the artful devices of a clever propogandist including inuendo in the form of questions, half truths, selective omission, shifted emphasis, boring repetition, and equivocation. He odes this in a manner which has you believing it until you digest his statement a bit.

Mr. Walker asserted that most conditional licenses were obtained by fraud! He also states that the CB-like conduct of a few hams makes us just like them and that as a matter of fact, the CB mess created by the FCC was somehow the fault of the amateur. All these statements border on insult, and I got the impression that many of those around my table felt insulted. Mr. Walker at times quoted from passages of our regulations and stated that ham radio was not quite living up to the letter of these but he completely ignored sub-sections of the same regulations having to do with public service and disaster communications. He professes great love and a certain nostalgia for ham radio and then in the same breath attempts to build a case showing where ham radio and the amateur has not really contributed much to our society and the radio art and states that the advances of the future will come from the large industrial complex and not from the individual.

Mr. Walker admits that the amateur and ham radio is well self-policed, and that the league has done a good job of cementing all this together, and then cited the conduct of a few to justify the need for greater regulation and control. Also mentioned was the fact that the league does not really represent the radio amateur since not all hams are members. What other body should represent our interests then? Maybe Mr. Walker?

At the present time, the amateurs of this country are putting together the worlds finest disaster and civil defense communications network making use of repeaters on the various bands, the MARS system, high frequency nets, inter-connections to the telephone lines, and digital control of interconnections of this whole set-up. These plans are just beginning to jell. Mr. Walker and the FCC seem bent on disrupting all this through heavy handed and nonsensical regulation. One wonders at the reason.

It is clear that the present trend of the FCC action and the plans offered by a prominent and powerful member constitute a serious threat to ham radio. It is my feeling that we shall be able to counter this threat in a legal way. However, it is important that we do nothing at this time will reflect poorly on ham radio. Name calling mud slinging, and suggestions that we disregard the law as others seem to be doing, are untimely and poor advice. HELP!

A mathematical study of the E-Layer propagation of VHF signals has been started. This study is under the direction of Mel Wilson, W2BOC/WlDEI, who is well known for his long-term work on this phenomenon and for his excellent articles on the subject in December, 1970 and March, 1971 QST.

The study is currently concentrating on a single day, November 8, 1970, a date on which extensive E_S propagation was observed. Although many observations for this date have been reported and documented, additional data is required to complete the statistical work in progress.

 - (e) Time QSO ended.

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
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
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
