The following is extracted from a complaint filed in Common Pleas Court of Philadelphia against one of our club members.

For a period in excess of three years, defendants have systematically harassed and persecuted plaintiffs without reasonable cause or justification as follows:

Since 1966 defendant has operated a wireless radio set at his residence which interfered with the picture and voice on plaintiffs television set. Plaintiff's complaints over this interference with their quiet enjoyment of the television set in their home has caused defendants to engage in a course of conduct, vilification and harassment, intended to cause plaintiffs to move from their residence.

Since 1966 defendant has engaged in the unlicensed and unathorized sale and repair of wireless radio receivers, and television sets at his residence, thereby causing the common driveway to be filled with automobiles so that plaintiffs were denied the right of entrance and departure.

In the summer of 1966, attempted to enter plaintiff's residence and claims to have authority under F.C.C. regulations to search their residence to remove the thermostat from plaintiff's refrigerator and air conditioner because they interfered with the reception of his wireless radio sets.

Defendant often takes pictures of plaintiffs with a camera to confuse, intimidate and harass them. Since this time defendants have cursed plaintiffs on many occasions and addressed loud and abusive language and threats at them.

Since 1966, defendants have constantly and repeatedly banged on the party wall of their home, slammed the door, as well as banged on piano keys, thereby interfering with plaintiff's quiet enjoyment of their home.

Since 1966, defendants have attached a fog horn to their front door so that it emits a loud blast whenever the door is opened, thereby frightening and alarming plaintiffs at any and all hours of the day or night in their home.

Since 1968, defendants have called plaintiffs foul and vile names on many occasions.

In the fall of 1966, defendant attempted to strike plaintiff Josephine Grigerowic: with a motor vehicle on several occasions. Defendant attempted to push a baby coach into a collision with a motor vehicle being operated by plaintiff John Grigerowicz.

Every summer since 1966, defendants repeatedly and constantly hosed the common pavement from the front doors to the street with great and excessive amounts of water causing plaintiffs to get their shoes wet in order to leave or return to their home.

Since 1966, whenever defendants dumped the water from their portable swimming pool, they would cause the water to flood plaintiff's lawn.

Dedendants teased and harassed plaintiff's father (now deceased) whenever he was outside tending to the lawn or shrubbery by sicing their dog on him and by calling him names.

Since 1966, defendants constantly honk the horn of their car to harass plaintiffs. They operate their car at great speed and screech to a halt in front of plaintiff's home and blow the horn loudly and repeatedly. They follow plaintiffs in their auto whenever plaintiffs leave their home.

On Sunday, July 6, 1969, defendants had a lawn party wherein defendants and their guests amused themselves by throwing firecrackers at and against plaintiff's residence, thereby interfering with plaintiff's quiet enjoyment of their home and causing them to become fearful and apprehensive. On this occasion, the defendants said "I wish this was a bomb". One of the defendant said "I wish they would come out. I could take care of them and make it look like an accident".

Defendants have often expressed their intention and desire to frame plaintiffs and have them arrested. In July 1969 defendants falsely accused plaintiffs of having stolen their cat and caused a policeman to search their home and garage for the cat.

Defendants operate an electric gasoline generator in their garage which emits noxious fumes which seep into plaintiff's home.

All of the above specified actions of the defendants have caused plaintiffs to become nervous, upset and ill, to lose sleep and peace of mind, to spend substantial sums of money for counsel fees, all without reasonable and probable cause.

Wherefore, plaintiff's bring this action in the nature of a Bill of Peace and pray the Court to:

- Enjoin defendants from further harassment or persecution of the plaintiffs, from trespassing upon or damaging plaintiff's property and from threatening or assualting plaintiffs.
- b. Direct that defendants pay the costs of this suit.
- c. Grant such other relief as may appear proper to the Court under the circumstances.

You see what a TVI complaint can lead to. After you finish laughing about the charges, consider several things:

- 1. An attorney will have to be retained to defend the suit (approximately \$1500)
- 2. It could have been you.

NEW PRODUCTS OF INTEREST TO HAMS WONSI, Lyn Rowland

1. Broadband Amplifiers 30-400 MHz

Several broadband amplifiers are available from Radiation Devices Co., covering the range 3-500 MHz. However, the most interesting to hams would be the BBA-1 rated at a minimum gain of 10 db from 3-500 MHz. Unit operates on 12 VDC. Input and output connections are ENC type. Price \$30. P.O. Box 8450, Baltimore Maryland 21234.

2. Series Voltage Regulators (Solid State)

Two models in three voltage ranges are available at very reasonable prices from Powertec, Inc. The two power ratings are 90 and 180 watts. Voltage ratings are 4.5-6.5 - 11.5-15.6 - 17.5-24.5 DC. The exact voltage needed can be set with an adjustment pot mounted on the unit. Prices are: 90 watt \$15; 180 watt - \$22.

3. Two Meter Vertical Gain Antenna

Rated at 500 watts and 6 DB gain, this antenna would be of greatest interest to FM operators. Bandwidth is 3 MHz or more at 146 MHz. Unit is about 12 feet high and can be mounted on a 3/4 pipe. Price \$60. An-Tek Industries, Box 357, R.R. 5, Elkhart, Ind. 46514.


GAMMA MATCH FOR 220 MHz YACI ANTENNA


An easily constructed and adjusted gamma match has been in continuous use on a 220 MHz Yagi Antenna at KISFF for the past four years. The only component not found in most junk boxes is the glass piston capacitor. However, these are often found in surplus or could be purchased new from an electronic supply house. Capacitor value required is approximately .8-18 pf. I used a JFD VC 27. The stator end of the capacitor is slid into a 1 copper tube 32 long and the stator soldered to the tube. Use just enough heat to do the job and you should not have any trouble. Mount a large ground lug to the threaded end of the capacitor and solder the other end of the ground lug to the center pin of a type V connector attached to the antenna boom with a small piece of aluminum angle stock. Fashion a sliding short from 1/2" wide, 1/16" thick flashing copper. The length of copper required and the spacing between the bends will depend on the dimensions of your particular antenna boom and driven element. With normal boom sizes the distance between the copper tube and driven element is about one inch. Therefore, a piece of flashing copper about 5" long will be necessary. Thoroughly clean the copper tube and antenna driven element with steel wool in the vicinity where the sliding short will be attached. Bend the short to shape according to the accompanying sketch. Slip the sliding short down over the antenna element and copper tube. Tighten the sliding short just enough so that it makes good contact but can still be moved in and out.

Use a SWR bridge in the transmission line close to the antenna.

Tune the match for minimum SWR by first adjusting the position of the sliding short and then adjusting the capacitor. Continue adjusting

alternately the position of the short and capacitor until you have a good match. Tighten down the sliding short and coat all joints with glyptol. Place a plug in the outside end of the copper tube to keep water out.
