JULY WHITE ELEPHANT SALE: AT THE QTH OF WA20MY






144 Mhz Antennas




Stacked 6 Meter Antennas




222 MHz Antennas




Microwave Loopers and 10, 5.7 and 14 GHz Dishes













Bob, N3EXA and NON QRP Mobile Rig




Another view of a couple of Microwave Towers




