

The late Summer/early Fall season has frequently produced an interesting mix of propagation modes on the VHF/UHF bands. Many of the memorable tropo and ducting openings have occurred during this time of the year, so keep an ear on the bands as well as your club repeater. If you're the first to discover an opening or hear something unusual, get on the repeater and make an announcement so that others can get in on the excitement.

On August 2nd Six was open from the Philadelphia area to 8 and 9 land starting at 2345 GMT. Several local Packrats were heard but activity on the 'DX' end was rather sparse. Again the following evening, on the 3rd, Six opened shortly to 5 land. Activity, however, was sparse on both ends of the opening.

Two meters showed some signs of life on the 9th at 0110 GMT when VEIRG (FN65) worked a number of stations in the Philadelphia area. The Perseids meteor shower peaked on the 12th without lasting very long. WC2K reports that the shower started and ended rather abruptly, although conditions were at least average, with long duration bursts during the peak. Rick worked NN9K (EN41 ILL) on 220, and a new state, NØBTN (EN11, Nebraska) also on 220! The band has otherwise been relatively quiet as compared to the Es opening we experienced this Spring. Let's hope things improve.

On the 14th, Six opened again to some DX around 1500 GMT. Mike, N3BBI reports working TO2KK at 1519 GMT and C6ANY at 1526 GMT. Mike heard HH7PV periodically but wasn't able to make a two-way. On the evening of the 20th, the band opened to FL, Key West, and the Mid-West. Mike reports hearing AL7AW (listed as Alaska) but no two-way was made as Mike was running low power at the time. If anyone else has heard AL7AW on, or can confirm his QTH, give Mike a call. Perhaps the band will open again in the near future to Alaska!

As a reminder, this author is always looking for your propagation news - band openings, any unusual propagation or enhancement and reports of stations active in rare grids. Hope to hear more Packrats on the band as the cooler weather approaches.

NEWS FROM BOULDER, COLORADO Yardley Beers, WØJF

Enclosed is a photocopy of my bit on the Isle of Man in World Radio, an account of my 75th birthday collebration, which refers to our recent trip to Australia with Elderhostel. Amateur radio played a minor part in the two latter events. On the 75th birthday hike, I sent word by 2 meter HT when we would be down the mountain and when our XYL's should plan to start the party. The Australian trip coincided with the Bicentennial. One day the whole group went out in a bus to see the Tall Ships, but we could not find them. I got on my HT and found out where they were. We are planning to return to Australia with Elderhostel in January 1989 and to include New Zealand in the trip. Incidentally in 1956 we spent six months in Sydney.

During the June VHF contest, four of us manned WØIA in the rare grid square DM81 near Rocky Ford, Colorado. We had a five band station with big beams. We had a pipe line to W6 land and half of our contacts were with W6. One time I pointed our 50 MHz with a 32 foot boom east, and still kept working one W6 right after another, and I could not hear any thing to the east at that time.

For the September VHF contest, we are planning to activate another rare grid square, DN60, with a station at Rabbit Ears Pass, east of Steam Boat Springs. Instead of the heavy equipment we used in June we are thinking of making this a back pack DXPEDITION, as we have done in other some other September contests.

Here in Boulder County we are having a bitter fight over antenna towers. The county government has recently passed very harsh legislation, but they have instituted lenient procedure for obtaining exceptions. (NøRR was granted an exception for seven 100 foot towers.) That is a poor way of dealing with the problem. As the regulations now stand, (1) there can only be only one tower per property, no matter how large it may be even if it is a square mile, (2) that tower must be no higher than 35 feet, and (3) all portions of any antenna (even wire antennas attached to trees) must be set back from all property lines by at least a distance equal to the height of the antenna above ground. This fight is occupying a lot of our attention and is the subject of a number of court cases. Fortunately these regulations do not affect me directly because (1) I live in the City of Boulder, which is exempt, and (2) there is a "grandfather" clause which exempts existing antennas.

GUINEA BISEAU ON 50 MHz ?? Via Joe Burke, WA80GS

Dave Heil, J52US, has obtained 50 MHz operating privileges! Bisseau is on the western tip of Africa, about 12 degrees north of the equator. Dave has been very active on the HF bands since arriving in Bisseau several months ago, and his QSL card requests. Several members of the Midwest VHF/UHF Society are working toward obtaining a 50 MHz transceiver for loan to Dave. But donations are needed to get this accomplished.

Equipment being sought is: a Yaesu 620B transceiver, a brick amplifier, and a memory keyer. This setup would enable Dave to run the 620B (which has a squelch that works on CW/SSB) with the memory keyer as a "breakable" beacon. He could be working the HF bands while the beacon is doing its job. When the beacon is heard, the receiving station would call J52US. Dave's squelch would open, alerting him to the opening. (This system worked very well for Jim Holt and the crew at PJØM.)

Dave's stateside call is K8MN, and he is from the Cincinnati area. He works for the US Department of State, which normally gives two year assignments in foreign countries. When Dave leaves, we would decide if the loaned rig would stay with a dependable operator in the country, go with Dave on his next assignment, or get passed on to another good 50 MHz country.


